Project: School Rehabilitation after Flood Disaster Ban Mae Pao School, Chiang Rai Province Chiang Rai Primary Education Service Area Office 4

Project Background

Chiang Rai Province and its neighboring northern areas were recently hit by prolonged heavy rainfall that led to severe flooding. The disaster left widespread damage to homes, farmlands, and community infrastructure, and schools were among the most vulnerable. Many schools in rural areas already operate with limited resources, and the impact of the flood further strained their ability to provide a safe and effective learning environment.

Ban Mae Pao School, a small community-based primary school in Phaya Mengrai District, was heavily affected. Floodwaters damaged classrooms, essential equipment, and learning materials, creating obstacles for both students and teachers. Without timely assistance, the disruption would have had long-term effects on students' education and the school's daily operations.

To ensure that teaching and learning could continue without prolonged interruption, the school urgently required support in replacing essential materials, furniture, and storage facilities. The project was therefore initiated to restore a functional learning environment, reduce the burden on teachers, and help students regain stability in their education after the disaster
